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
#### Climb Aboard The Club Car!

Planning is moving quickly for the 2015 PCR Convention in Newark (in the San Francisco Bay Area) on May 13-17, 2015!

#### **Prototype and Layout Tours**

One of the Prototype Tours planned for the Convention is to the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, which is one of the foremost national security research and development laboratories in the world. Founded in 1952 as a second nuclear weapons lab, LLNL has grown into a multi-program facility that includes stewardship of the nation's nuclear stockpile, advanced conventional weapons, biotechnology for medicine and counter terrorism, energy development, high energy density physics (HEDP), and new



age facilities needed to perform research in all areas.

The half-day tour will involve presentations and demonstrations on the history of the Lab and overviews of current programs. A highlight of the trip will be a tour to the National Ignition Facility (operational constraints permitting), the world's largest laser used for research into HEDP, material properties in pressure and temperature realms previously unattainable, and the development of fusion energy.

Bus transportation between the Lab and the hotel is included. Note that all participants will be required to fill out an information form for preclearance into the Lab. The tour will be held on Thursday, May 14 and is

priced at \$25. The number of participants will be limited. If it sells out, ticket allocation will be by convention registration number. All bus tours will be prioritized the same way. Ticket sales will begin as soon as the rest of the bus tours are finalized so that attendees can make informed choices.

There are currently 41

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

A total of 13 Op Sessions are currently scheduled for Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings. There will also be on Op Session on Saturday and another one on Sunday. 

## Convention Hotel and Registration Rates

#### **President's Message**

First off, since I know that this issue of the Branch Line is going to every member of the region, not just those that regularly subscribe, I would



like to extend a greeting to all of our membership. If you are not a regular subscriber, I would ask you to consider adding a subscription when you renew your membership. After taking time to read the articles that appear in this issue, I believe that you will agree that you won't get this much quality in most of the hobby publications, for just \$8.00 a year – that's only \$2.00 per issue, much less than the rest of the other printed publications. Also, though I will mention it again in this column, please consider getting

involved in the activities and/or administration of either your local division, or the PCR. If you have questions about whether you are getting what you want or need from the NMRA, this is one way that YOU can have a direct input on what you (and your fellow members) receive in exchange for your dues. No matter what you might want to believe, those of us that help run the local face of the NMRA do NOT have any direct link to the Oracle at Delphi, we're just plain old muddlers trying to give our friends something which they can make use of and any help is always appreciated.

As I start on the meat of this issue's column I find myself thinking about all of the people that I have met over my years in this hobby, that would include those that were just passing acquaintances, those that became friends within the railroad hobby — both model railroading and railfanning — and those that have become close and dear personal friends with our lives sharing experiences both with and without trains. This is one of those benefits of the NMRA that one just cannot quantify, no matter how we try to explain it. With the exception of the twenty-eight years that I spent involved in motorsports, I cannot think of any aspect of my life where I made so many truly close and dear friends that were spread over such a wide range — both geographically and socially. I am going to take most of this column to try and speak to this opportunity that is available to each of us in the NMRA.

To try and put things in perspective, over the years I have been involved in both the performing and production side of the rock-and-roll business, where over thirty years I met people working at all levels of the "music biz". I also spent several years in the late '60s through the mid '70s

where I was a competitor in bicycle racing at the national level, traveling across the United States and Canada. Yet, only in motorsports and trains have I met so many people where what created a relationship seemed to come down to the basics of what kind of person you were, where it seemed that you were only judged on your personal merits. And more importantly if you passed that judgement, you were accepted for what you were, not where you sat on the "social ladder". In both of these avocations – and yes, that really is what they are – you are judged by what you can and are willing to do, not by how rich or famous you might be. And maybe not surprisingly, there have been more than a few cases where I met the same people in both environments (the PCR's late Bob Booth and Charlie Bedard being just two of these). Though I do find it interesting, how many folks I have met that share a serious involvement in both auto racing and trains. I have sat down at model railroad events and shared a cold beer with people who could buy or sell me from their pocket change and with others that probably couldn't handle my monthly gasoline bill. Yet, the only considerations seemed to be. what railroad do you model, what scale(s) do you work in, what was your latest project, would you like to come over for an operating session, etc.

Most of us that have been involved in this hobby for a while seem to enjoy just talking trains. I have managed to learn something from pretty much every modeler that I've taken the time to talk with. More importantly, I have somehow managed to have something worth passing on to many others. This is quite probably the greatest benefit of model railroading, that the process of learning is continuous. Every time I look at someone else's layout, I seem to learn some new technique that I can use to improve my modeling – be it rolling stock, structures, scenery, or operating processes. At every operating session that I attend, I learn just a bit more about how the real railroads operated. Each time I talk with someone about a given railroad. I learn something new about railroad history and often about the history of my country or community. And best of all, I seem to always learn just a bit more about these people who have become my friends and often traveling companions. If you enjoy learning (and as one that lived my childhood with a school teacher as a parent, that became an ingrained part of my mental DNA). there are more opportunities for that than one can even begin to count. I have the pleasure of knowing among my model railroad friends, lawyers, police officers, mechanics, truck drivers, PhDs, machinists, school teachers, and common craft workers, political liberals and conservatives, but they all have one thing in common - their love of trains and things railroad. Model railroading is one of the most democratic hobbies in the world, the only thing most modelers look at is what you choose to bring to the table. Yes, there are a few puttsies in this hobby, but no more than in any other group of the same size.

The next time you talk to someone at a division meet or a convention – be it regional, national, or focused on some niche segment of the hobby – take some time and try to find out a bit more about how that person ended up in the hobby. This would include the basic, "how did you get involved in trains?" question. But, take it a bit farther and ask about how they got involved in the type of modeling that they're doing today, whether it be narrow gauge logging operations or modern class one mainline freight trains. You may find it quite interesting, especially since you will often learn a bit

more about your friend and the path to this point in their life. (Please note that I have not mentioned many of the people in my experience by name, mostly because I don't want to put them on the spot.) You may notice that I continue to speak about getting to know people beyond their involvement in trains and model railroading. I have always felt that no matter how involved I am in various forms of model railroading, I always view it as just a hobby – there is so much more to the "quality of life" that reaches far beyond this hobby. That being said, this experience that reaches beyond trains often adds so much to the quality of the hobby as well.

In saying this, I ask that you take this as an opportunity get involved in model railroading activities in our region (or, if you are reading this, but are from outside the PCR, in your home region) and find one of those non-quantifiable benefits of NMRA membership. The next time you sign up for a railroad or model railroad convention, take some time and look outside your regular area of interest and see what might be waiting for you there. Take the opportunity and spend some time with folks that you might not know as well, you might find a new friend just waiting to meet you. But most of all, have fun.

Speaking of which, I do hope that most of you have taken the opportunity to register for the next two big NMRA activities coming along. The first would be the 2015 PCR Regional convention, coming to Newark this next May. David Parks and his team are putting together what looks to be a great convention, with a focus on model railroad clubs and how they can contribute to our enjoyment of the hobby. The second would be the 2015 NMRA National Convention, which will be just north of us, in Portland, Oregon. Both of these events hold a lot in store for those that choose to attend. This coming June 20<sup>th</sup>, the Bay Area Prototype Modelers (BAPM) will be having their annual meet, in Richmond. As we get closer, this event should be showing up in the PCR Master Calendar, on the region's website at www.pcrnmra.org. A bit farther out, the Bay Area Garden Railway Society (BAGRS) will be putting on the 2016 National Garden Railway Convention, July 4<sup>th</sup> through the 10<sup>th</sup> in Santa Clara. Even if you are not a garden railway modeler, there will be several clinics that will be of benefit to any modeler and there will be over 60 fantastic garden railways to visit as part of the layout tours. There is more information on this event at their web site, www.bagrs.org. I hope to see you at all of these events.

Moving on to some regional matters, the PCR Board of Directors had their regular mid-year meeting this past October and, in spite of our best efforts, it seems like we got a lot accomplished – though the meeting took a bit longer than I really wanted. For those who were there, thank you. It always makes it a lot easier for those of us on the board when we're not working in a vacuum. I would also like to take a moment and publicly thank the PCR board for the time and effort that they spend on your behalf. While in general it isn't too much time, for some that travel from afar there is a cost of both time and money involved and I want them to know that I truly appreciate their effort. Especially a BIG thank you to Mel Jones (who drove down from Carson City, NV) and Dave Grenier (who drove up from the Fresno area) for their contribution. These people are making this effort for you, the members of the PCR. Please let your Division Directors (and the others that work both on and with the BoD) that you appreciate the effort that they put forth for you.

At the mid-year meeting the board has taken some steps toward the creation of a new logo for the region and we hope to have the final word on this at the general membership meeting in May. Though right now, I would like to say a quick "Thank You" to Russ Clover for the design work that he has put into this project. If accepted, this new logo may (at least initially) be more of a supplement to the existing logo, rather than a direct replacement. More to come on this.

Finally, this issue of the Branch Line should have the ballots for President and Vice President of the region and I would ask you to please turn these around and get them mailed in quickly. While there may not be a wide selection of members running for these positions, it really does count for a lot from the candidates position when they see that the membership cares enough to vote in these elections. And again, please let them know that you appreciate the effort that they are willing to put forward on your behalf.

#### From the Fireman' Seat

Today I will be making a lot of statements for which there is minimal or no actual established facts to support. So if you see anything that is



outright ridiculous, offensive, or downright mistaken, please feel free to respond accordingly. I don't have thin skin about this at all.

And as usual, the topic is the aging of the NMRA.

When I first starting riffing on this I encountered some reluctance to accepting the fact that the NMRA was an aging organization without enough "backfill" of newly entered younger members to keep it going indefinitely. One argument I heard or read frequently is that younger

people don't join, that you had to wait for the kids to grow up and the work career to wind down for them to consider it. Although this might be somewhat true, I found it interesting that some of the people making that case had themselves joined at an early age.

Anyway, some time back I published in these very pages an analysis (with pictures!), showing that our average age of PCR members was increasing over time and that our members had in fact joined at an age that was quite younger than retirement time. If you want to refresh your memory, check out the January-March 2012 and then the July-September 2013 issues. In the first instance members had joined at an average age of 44 and were now 62 years old on average. Less than two years later the average age had increased to 67, but the age of joining was still about the same. Meanwhile I've seen on-line discussions citing other sources, perhaps more rigorous than my efforts, showing the same basic trend nationwide, as well as a decrease in total membership.

So given that we are in fact an aging organization the only questions remaining are whether it matters to us or not and if it does what to do about it.

Both of these questions have been churning around for sometime on

the Yahoo forums, with endless go-arounds on possible strategies for attracting and keeping younger members (sometimes defined as people under sixty!) without disenfranchising our current members. I usually refrain from adding comments myself because I find it difficult to come up with something that hasn't already been said. Much of the time PCR luminary Bill Kaufman says most of what I would, but in a more informed manner, with facts at his fingertips. Some of the ideas bouncing around are quite good. At least people are trying, which is good.

Handwriting on the wall comes in a variety of forms. One example is what has happened recently to Railroad Model Craftsman (yes, I know it has been rescued, at least for now). This was a hard hit to take. For myself, I recall pages from RMC from my preteen youth that inspired me, long before I joined the NMRA in my late forties. But despite the high regard in which we older modelers hold that venerable publication, it just wasn't making enough money to cover costs. Hopefully the new publisher succeed with its rebirth, but only time will tell.

In contrast to RMC, the Kalmbach equivalent, Model Railroader, is apparently doing just fine. Some of my modeling buddies view MR as a glossed up, superficial magazine that caters to beginners and neglects the true craftsman/hobbyist. So how could such an unfair situation come about?

Well, let me put my spin on this. I have subscribed to both of these magazines for years. In recent times MR has bombarded me via electronic media. There are newsletters with embedded videos, links to a website with discussion groups and online sales of special extras, loads of annoying email adds for back issues, special publications, and new books (with are often compilations of old MR articles). At one point there was a rather brash promotion for a video magazine, similar to what the record clubs used to do. You know, send something unsolicited that you can either pay for or go to the trouble of returning. If I Google a model railroad topic, I'm more likely than not to find links to discussion forums on the MR site. And of course, if I browse the magazine racks at my local Safeway or Barnes & Noble I might find MR there. But certainly not RMC.

Model Railroader, as I learned from lurking in the forums, has more Facebook "likes" than the NMRA has on its page. This is a clue that there are plenty of model railroad people out there that are not part of the NMRA.

Unless I have been napping too much or suffer from some sort of selective amnesia, I have never seen anything like that coming from Carstens. It's as if you don't know about RMC already it isn't for you. And of course there are less and less of us that already know about RMC. Which, by the way, is the sort of model railroading snobbishness that could relegate the NMRA to the dustbins of history. The fact that MR reaches out to beginners is part of their success. Did I mention that it includes articles meant for beginners?

Fortunately the NMRA has been working to enter the 21<sup>st</sup> century. There is a digital newsletter, the website is undergoing dramatic changes for the better, and so on. But whenever changes are made there will always be some that feel left out. One recent Yahoo entry pointed out that a significant proportion of one Midwest division's members live in rural areas with limited email and no high speed Internet service. They would be left out in the

cold by many of the options to go digital with newsletters and announcements. Figuring out how to balance the needs and interests of existing members versus potential younger members is no easy feat.

I'd like to wrap up this meandering column by describing a personal encounter with one of these mythical younger modelers. This young man recently graduated from high school and is headed for military service. He has been a train nerd for years and joined the NWP Historical Society at an age when his parents had to transport him to meetings. He quickly dove into historical research and has given impressive slide talks about areas of interest to him. These have largely focused on more recent, e.g., post Southern Pacific, NWP history, where he has made a mark for himself. Most of the older membership of the Historical Society is more interested in older steam and narrow gauge days on the NWP. He and I got together because he was interested in seeing my NWP flavored layout before he went off to boot camp.

He arrived on a bicycle, carrying a box with several of his own locomotives. These included Athearn "blue box" SD9s, one of them decorated for California Northern. He spent at least two hours running trains, including my double-headed Eureka Southern GP-38s and his own locomotives. During the process he shot photos of the trains with his phone and texted them to his girlfriend, who is apparently planning a Eureka Southern layout herself. He was knowledgeable about DCC and his preferred prototype, including the Gen Set diesel currently running on the NWP. He was also up to speed on various diesels that ran on the NWP tracks in various post steam eras.

Here's the rub. Despite his high level of interest, obsession if you will, he had no interest in joining the NMRA. And yet he is an active member of the Historical Society! He has also been involved with a local modular group based on the NWP. Why not the NMRA? He cited the cost and his limited budget, but that didn't make sense to me. Somehow he managed to obtain and decorate locomotives, even adding decoders. The only answer I can think of is that nothing that goes on in the NMRA, at least in his understanding of it, is attractive enough for him to make a commitment.

This is a far cry when the NMRA was the face of model railroading, virtually creating the hobby we know with its implementation of standards and recommended practices. Sounds like we have an image problem to overcome here. This is a challenge, yes, but one that is worthwhile pursuing.

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#### **Achievement Program**

We all enjoy this hobby more because of the numerous volunteers who work on our behalf at the National level, produce our regional



conventions, and help out at our divisional meets. All of these people can be referred to as Association Volunteers which is a category under the Achievement Program. Like the other certificates, the full requirements for this category are available on the Internet at the NMRA site, www.nmra.org. Knowing that this is a category for the Master Model Railroader program might encourage you to volunteer at one of these levels. For those who have already volunteered, submit your paperwork!

The intent of the requirements for Association Volunteer is to reward those modelers who volunteer at the National, Regional, or Divisional level of the NMRA. A total of 60 time units (TUs) are required to satisfy this requirement. There are a number of ways to accrue these credits. For example:

- Active satisfactory service as a National committee member or Chairman of a Regional committee receives 2 TUs per month.
- Active satisfactory service on a Regional committee or Divisional Chairman is good for 1 TU per month.
- Service as a Divisional officer or director is worth 1 TU per month.
- Active satisfactory service as a Division committee or board member equals ½ TU per month.

While these TUs are typical for those given for elected or appointed officials, there are other TUs which are available for volunteer efforts:

- Judges at NMRA sponsored model contests are given 3 TUs per event for judging National contests, 2 TUs for Regional contests, and 1 TU for assisting at Divisional contests.
- Modelers who open their layouts for tours are also eligible for credit at the rate of 3 TUs per day for National, Regional, and Divisional events (with a maximum of 12 TUs for a National convention, 6 TUs for Regional events, and 3 TUs for Divisional events.)
- Individuals who participate in modular layout displays at National, Regional, and Divisional meets are also eligible for 3 TUs per day, with the same maximums as for layout tours.
- Note that there is generally a maximum of 48 TUs of credit for any one National, convention, 24 TUs for any one Regional convention, and a maximum of 6 TUs for any one Divisional convention.

There are a number of committees at the Regional level. So what exactly constitutes a "committee?" Basically, just about any office or function that isn't covered under Association Official. Most other officers in a Division (or Region) are considered Committee Chairmen. For example, if your Division has a person who runs the contest at the monthly meeting, they can be considered the "Contest Committee Manager". Your local AP

representative is a member of the "Region AP Committee" and so on.

Individuals who work just the day of an event (for example, at a Convention registration desk) receive credit for one month's work as a committee member.

The bottom line—keep track of those hours of service to the hobby! The easiest way to do this is to obtain a Record Form (available at www.nmra.org) and have it signed by your local AP Chairman at the time or another official. For open house events, you may also be able to use the official Convention Program as verification of your service to the hobby.

Once you have accumulated a total of 60 certified TUs, complete a Statement of Qualifications and submit it along with a copy of your Membership card.

## Hip Hip Hooray, Hip Hip Hoorey, Hip Hip Hooray

Hear Yee, hear Yee, hear Yee ladies and gentlemen and all ferroequinologists in general, changes are coming to the contest room at your next regional convention. Just to show you that your contest management team did not hibernate during the off season (oh my, says I, what month is this? Oh good it is still early winter, YAWN) we have proposed and accepted modifications to how the contest is to be run and how it is presented at the award ceremony, all in the interest of fairness and in saluting the participants in this wonderful venue that is so much part of our annual get-togethers.

#### First change

I submitted a proposal to your PCR's BOD (Board of Directors) to change the language in the PCR's Contest Directory to eliminate the point disparity assigned to the scratch-building category between a kit-built and a scratch-built model, and instead assign the full 15 points available to either entry so as to eliminate a seemingly inherent bias toward the scratchbuilt models. The judges assigned to this category will be the ultimate decision makers, not the point penalty. The BOD voted unanimously to adopt the change which will become standard procedure beginning with your next regional convention.

#### The Answers Are Out There: Paper Shell Scenery

In the photo on the next page an SP way freight emerges from a conifer forest somewhere in western Oregon on its way to the end of a bucolic branch line. The date is the early 1950s and the action takes place on my Fall Creek Branch, an HO scale portable switching layout. I'm sure you'll agree that the scenery on a model railroad does far more than any other element of our hobby to create a realistic setting in which to enjoy the trains we love. Whether our primary interest is operation, photography, or just watching the locomotives roll by, believable scenery greatly enhances the enjoyment.

Unfortunately, model scenery construction is intimidating to many modelers. How many of you have built the benchwork, laid the track, installed the wiring, and then stalled out, unsure of how best to go about tackling the scenery? There are plenty of ready-to-run and kit

versions—complete with detailed instructions—of locomotives, rolling stock, and structures, but the scenery is pretty much going to be all you, from initial design to final detailing. In this column I want to propose a very low stress method to construct your desired topography.

The January 2007 issue of <u>Railroad Model</u> <u>Craftsman</u> featured an article by Howard Zane, in which he presented a technique for

creating model terrain without plaster. Frankly, the process he described seemed too simple to work well, so I tried it out on a small diorama and was favorably impressed. It turned out to be inexpensive and easy (two of my favorite qualities) and gives results which are comparable to the traditional hard-shell technique. The key element in this method is red rosin paper, a heavy paper used as a flooring underlayment. I purchased mine at Home Depot for the princely sum of \$11 (this was back in 2008). What I got for my money was a roll of paper 3 feet wide and 166 feet long, which I estimate will get me through my next four layouts.

Here's the recipe: start with basic scenery support, which could be carved Styrofoam, criss-crossed corrugated cardboard strips, or simply wadded-up newspaper to define the basic shape of the terrain. Then, instead of plaster-soaked paper towels, you simply attach pieces of the heavy paper with hot glue. After you have all of the paper terrain in place, you brush on full strength white glue. Several hours later add a second coat of the glue and you have a stiff paper shell which is ready to be colored and textured.

That's the basic method, but here are some useful details. After you have the basic support, tear off pieces of the red rosin paper about one foot square and wad each of them up into a tight ball. When flattened out again, each piece exhibits many small facets in a complex pattern which looks quite natural and adds pleasing detail to a hillside or field. Hot glue each piece to the subroadbed, basic scenery support, and to adjoining pieces of paper. Work from the bottom to the top of a hill so that upper sheets will overlap lower ones and hide any small gaps that appear.

A nice feature of this system is that you get to see what the terrain will look like <u>before</u> you add the glue, when it's still easy to make changes. You can flatten high spots by applying hot glue and pressing the paper down against the cardboard or other support; low spots can be raised by stuffing wadded up newspaper underneath. When adding the white glue, I thin it slightly with water to make it easier to brush on. This may result in a few small drips, but they are far less messy and much easier to control than wet plaster. If the edges of the paper pieces are too noticeable, you can putty the edges with joint compound and let dry for 24 hours. I have used Pro Form All Purpose Joint Compound for this.

To this scenery shell we can now add rock castings, color, and texture. Plaster or plastic resin castings can be glued to the paper shell. Between the two materials, I prefer the plastic resin for a variety of reasons, but that is a story for another time. I begin the coloring and texturing by painting the paper shell with latex paint. A good paint to represent dirt is Folk Art brand #879 Linen, a beige color manufactured by Plaid Enterprises, Inc. which I found at Michaels. When that is dry, I sprinkle on some finely sifted dirt. I attach the dirt with diluted white glue in a two-step process: I wet a small area with isopropyl rubbing alcohol from a medicine dropper, and then drizzle on the diluted white glue. The glue dries clear and the dirt is firmly affixed and looks like it belongs there. Continuing to add to the terrain surface, you can place talus, deadfall, and ground foam foliage and fasten it all down with the diluted white glue. Finally, add some trees and your scenery should look very realistic.

So is this method better than the traditional hard-shell plaster process utilizing the often recommended Hydrocal white gypsum cement? Here are some clear benefits to paper shell scenery:

It's cheaper: my essentially endless roll of red rosin paper and a gallon of white glue came in at about \$25 together; inexpensive paper towels can readily be found, but check out the price of a 100-pound bag of Hydrocal.

It's lighter: my roll of rosin paper weighed in at 15 pounds; did I mention that Hydrocal comes in 100-pound bags?

It's less messy: actually, no mess at all, except for those annoying hot glue strings and the very occasional drop of white glue; contrast that with the plaster powder and soupy glop which ends up everywhere.

It gives us a preview: with plaster it's hard to see exactly what the landforms will look like until the wet plaster-soaked towels are laid into place, at which point it's too late to make changes; with rosin paper you see the final appearance as soon as the paper is in place and you can pull up or push down areas <u>before</u> you add the white glue, so you get it right the first time.

It's easy to modify at any time: even after several coats of white glue have set up and you've added paint, dirt, bushes, and trees, you can push up or down to flex the stiffened paper into a new position; try that with plaster which has set up.

It's easier to do. You know the drill with plaster: lay down tarps everywhere the dry or wet plaster could fall, transport the heavy bag of Hydrocal without spilling any, mix the right amounts of plaster and water in a suitable container until it's the consistency of buttermilk, dip the paper towels in the milky goo and lay them in place, then clean up the mixing bowl and your hands and your clothes and all of the things that shouldn't have plaster on them but now do. Compare that experience with paper shell: tear off some pieces of paper, crumple them up, flatten them out again, hot glue them down, and brush on some nearly full-strength white glue.

Especially if you've been procrastinating on starting your scenery, I urge you to try the paper shell method. I used it on my portable layout initially in order to minimize the weight of a display I have to schlep from home to train shows and back, but the many other benefits have convinced me that this is also the process to use on any layout I construct.


OK, here are some innovative ideas that were published in the November/December issues of NMRA *e-Bulletin* to help get new members:

Ken Mattern, of the Mid-South Division, personally made a commitment to sponsor 3 *Railpass* memberships at one of the Mid-South Division's meets. Ken went on further to challenge all 12 members attending to sponsor at least one *RailPass*. It must have worked for them, because the Mid-South Division gained 17 new members. The sponsors were also challenged to be in direct and frequent contact with their sponsored


members, to personally remind them of division meetings, invite them to visit their layouts and promote the hobby as much as reasonable. Ah, frequent communications, where have I heard that one before?





Brewster also led the group through a ballasting clinic and many of the rest of us shared their secrets and techniques as well.



#### **Held Out!**


