St. Louis 2020 National Convention and National Train Show cancelled

As everyone is aware, the coronavirus has had a devastating impact around the world. It has caused the death of tens of thousands of people and that is not something to be trivialized.

OTICE RECEIENED AT PRESS TIME

The NMRA National convention, Gateway 2020, is scheduled to start on July 12, 2020, in St. Louis, Missouri. That being said, the local host group has determined that they can no longer continue with the preparations and operation of the convention. Among the reasons for this decision is the fact that one key member is ill with COVID-19. The host group requests your prayers for him.

Additionally, some members of the local model railroad community have withdrawn their model railroads from the tours, based on their understandable and valid concerns about allowing persons in their homes who may have the COVID-19 virus. Even if the virus is well under control, that does not mean that everyone who attends the convention would be virus-free.

Robert Amsler, Manager of the Meetings and Trade Show Department has advised the Officers and the Board of Directors of this decision and the Officers and Directors fully support cancelling the convention. Neither the Gateway 2020 crew nor the NMRA made this decision in haste or without careful consideration of all involved. The cancellation is in the best interest of the NMRA members, their family members, and the NMRA. It is noteworthy that the NMRA has never cancelled a convention before Gateway 2020 and that includes during World War II.

For those who have registered for the convention, the refund policy will be published as soon as possible at Gateway2020.org. We, the Gateway 2020 Committee, will need some time to make the necessary changes to the website to process the refunds.

Again, all involved regret this decision but we trust that you will understand the necessity and reasoning behind the decision.

Back On July 3, the editorial staff of the Branch Line made a special trip to Point Richmond, CA to visit the Golden State Model Railroad Museum, home of the East Bay Model Engineers Society. Ostensibly, the purpose of the trip was to deliver some twenty cartons of old back issues of Model Railroader, Trains, and Railroad Model Craftsman. But the underlying reason for the trek was to see what GSMRM had to offer.

The museum layout includes a large HO scale rail-road as well as sections of N scale and O scale. In addition to the second floor railroad room, the facility has an 1,800 square foot "club room" that is also used for various visiting modular clubs. EBMES member, Larry Price, had this to say about the facility:

"You could do a story on just the wiring under the HO railroad. Our Chief Electrician has done a masterful job. Our railroad is now DCC only. We ran trains on several large railroads that were short of electrical power and circuit breakers, and we didn't want to repeat that.

Our HO railroad has sixteen 20 amp power supplies, thirty three 8 amp boosters, and over one hundred thirty PSX circuit breakers. We are never short of power.

For potential members, an interested person visits for a few weeks. If they show the desire to join, they are offered a Trial Membership Application. The application is never handed to someone on their first visit. The Trial Membership period is normally six months.

We Begin 2020 under extraordinary circumstances, having just canceled PCR's 2020 convention, what I believe is the first total cancellation under public crisis conditions in our 75-year history. I am truly grateful for the dozens of volunteers who devoted countless hours to preparing for what would have been a great convention. If you see or talk to any of these volunteers—they're all listed in the convention website's Committee page—please extend a warm and sincere THANK YOU. We investigated postponement to autumn 2020, but the Board of Directors ultimately deemed this untenable, so PCR's next convention will be in Fresno in April 2021. I urge everyone to support that convention by promptly registering to attend when registration opens, contributing a clinic, opening your layout if you live nearby, or working on the convention committee.

If that location is too distant, consider joining the excellent planning committee or volunteer group for Rails by the Bay 2021, NMRA's National Convention in July 2021 in Santa Clara. Several key committee spots are not yet filled, and this is a

great chance to make a difference at the national level, with your hours counting toward an AP certificate. To express interest on that, please contact me.

Traditionally we present annual awards to division and region leaders at our annual convention. The convention may be scrubbed, but the awards won't be. We'll have announcements of award winners shortly and arrange delivery of awards on a remote basis.

How do we approach model railroading in a time of voluntary isolation or quarantine? PCR is actively investigating several options including webinars, virtual model contests based on images or videos submitted by the modeler, and other distance options. In the meantime, keep building models or operating your layout if you have one. Stay in touch with us via PCR's social media channels and discussion group, or by email or phone with your friends in PCR. Read modeling magazines. Contribute to *Branch Line*. Help us complete group projects like revision of the Convention Manual (committee members have received an outreach). Contact your division leaders to see how to help. Write me an e-mail. Do anything to stay in the community.

One bit of difficult news this quarter is that NMRA is raising the price of the NMRA Magazine associated with your membership by about 5%, after having no price increases for many years. At its March meeting in Atlanta, the Board of Directors reviewed the magazine's financial situation and regrettably determined that this cost increase is needed to cover rising hard costs associated with publication. Region presidents, including me, are continuing to advocate for an electronic publication option that could reduce costs. We are bending the ear of NMRA's Regional Advisory Council (RAC) director to get attention on this, and other issues.

Getting Off The Flat Spot

From time to time, and perhaps more frequently than I care to think, I get stuck. I find myself confronted with so many modeling projects that I can't choose just one and get started. I'm sure you've been there too:

You have been looking forward to finishing the trackside scenery in the cut separating the two sides of town, but before you can proceed there's that loose rail joint that needs to be soldered. But wait, you're out of solder and your Micro-Mark® shipment isn't due to arrive until Monday afternoon. So you turn your attention to adding weight to that last string of boxcars that have been spotted on the RIP track for the past four months. When you reach for the first boxcar to bring it to the workbench you are reminded of, and confronted with, how much dust accumulates in four months. Not wanting to attack the dust right now, you open your notebook to write yourself a reminder to dust the entire layout. On the page adjacent to where you jot down your dust note, you spot a hastily sketched schematic for wiring a bi-polar LED to display red, yellow, or green. That LED circuit is to be part of the searchlight signal that is to be installed trackside in the cut that separates the two sides of town. The same cut that needs the scenery completed before the signal can go in. The same scenery that is being held up because of the loose rail joint. The same rail joint repair that is being held up because the solder hasn't yet arrived. The solder that should be in the same shipment as the NJ International searchlight signal head, mast and relay box. After contemplating all this you just no longer have any ambition for adding weight to boxcars. Besides, it's almost time to go cut up that chicken for tonight's dinner.

As comical as this may seem, it is funny because it is rooted in reality. And the reality is that we tend to squander a lot of our modeling time fussing over such things while accomplishing nothing. So how do we prevent these situations or deal with them if they occur anyway? My best suggestion is to just do it. I've found that, nine times out of ten, just getting started goes a long way toward accomplishment. It's "getting off the flat spot". 

No dues or any other fees are collected during this period. If voted in, a Senior Member pays \$20 per month dues \$240/year). A key is \$10 (plus a \$20 deposit). We have no new member fees, no assessments, no initiation fees.

Once a week we have a janitorial service come in to clean the restrooms, mop the kitchen floor, vacuum the 1,800 sq ft club room, clean the glass between the public and the railroads, and sweep the 1,750 sq ft public walkway. This gives us more time to be model railroaders, the very reason why we are there in the first place.

Since we (the East Bay Model Engineers Society, established in April of 1933) is a social organization, we recently lowered the price of coffee and doughnuts available at our monthly meetings down to free. Actually the coffee is available 24/7, but the doughnuts rarely last 24 hours and never 7 days! Our soda and bottled water machine had its price reduced from \$1 down to 50¢. That's also proven to be very popular. It's outside so our visitors have voiced their appreciation that we are not charging as much as possible as most people expect.

During our visit, the club room was occupied by a twenty foot wide easel where member, Pete Aylward, was completing the last twenty feet of the Sierra Range backdrop.











Contest Room

Contest Report

As noted elsewhere, Clear to the Coast, the PCR's 2020 annual convention, has been cancelled. This was a result of a management decision by the Crowne Plaza Hotel parent company in response to the COVID-19 restrictions. It appears the next PCR con-

vention will take place sometime in 2021. The time and venue will be determined by the PCR Board of Directors.

As in years past, we will feature a full complement of contests for all our members – even those that may not be able to attend in person. The three big groupings are Models, Arts and Crafts and Photography, with a number of subcategories in each group. Going beyond this, all of the model categories have sub-groups for Youth (up through twelve years old) and Teen (thirteen through 17 years old), including the Module (portable layout) Contest. Also, every subcategory in the basic model contest has a Novice category, which is open to any modeler who has not (a) Received more than 87 points in the category being entered, (b) Received more than 100 points in any NMRA model contest, or (c) Earned a "Best of Show" in any NMRA contest. Contest Directory Complete.pdf) for all of the information. One doesn't have to build a fresh model just for this convention. If you have what you feel is a really good model sitting on your layout or a display shelf at home, maybe this is the time to share it with everyone else. As for the fear of the terrible "PAPERWORK" that needs to be filled in, we will have folks in the contest room to help you handle that and give you pointers that you can use going forward. For the Arts and Crafts categories, we encourage anyone interested to enter. This is not just a "Ladies Only" contest. In fact, a number of our male members have taken home awards in these categories and one of our male members actually took home "Best of

Show" at a NMRA National Convention. There are nine subcategories under Arts and Crafts, and we would love to have entries in every one. Again, all of the entry information is at the web site noted above.

The photography contest is always a great chance to express your love of trains and all things railroading. As before, the web link listed above will give the basic information regarding the photo categories, with those being included as: Model Black & White, Model Color, Trains in Action, Track and Structures, Working on the Railroad, General Railroad Subjects, and Prototype Black & White.

In the Module (portable layout) Contest, we have an opportunity for folks to show off their modular units or any small portable layout that they may have built. We will make every effort to provide space for anyone wanting to enter, though we ask that everyone be considerate of the fact that we will be sharing space in the contest room with other activities.

We will also need judges to cover five judging categories in groups of two or three and we would like to have one or two alternates, for when a judge might have a model entered that needs to be judged. It doesn't matter if you've never judged before, we will have a number of experienced judges to head each judging group, who will provide guidance and insight on how to judge the models. It is always educational to judge, because one has the opportunity to learn new techniques by seeing what others have done and to learn more about what the judges look for when judging your models. We will also need at least three judges for both Arts & Crafts and Photography.

In addition to the judged contests, there is the opportunity to present your items for non-judged display or Show and Tell as well. And there is the popular vote for any items issued in Models, Arts & Crafts and Photography. As a bonus, we will be including the "Square Foot Challenge" contest, the rules for which are VERY difficult (just kidding): The contest is for a diorama that is 12' X 12" and includes a piece of rail. Beyond that, it's wide open – scale and subject are free.





Achievement Program Master Model Railroader Qualifications By Jack Burgess, MMR, Manager, PCR Achievement Department

Continuing our discussion on various AP certificates, this month we'll review the requirements for **Author**. Like the other certificates, the full requirements for this category are available on the Internet at the NMRA site, http://www.nmra.com/author.

Points are awarded for this category for published articles or drawings, live clinics, instructional video tapes and multi-media, and electronic publications. In all cases, the subject **must** be model railroading (i.e., articles or clinics on a railroad prototype do not count toward the total score unless it includes significant information on how to model the particular prototype). To earn a certificate for Author, you need to accumulate a total of 42 points.

Published Articles

The number of points awarded for your efforts is dependent on the type of publication and the type of article or drawing. Points are earned per each full page as shown in this table:

Item	National Publi- cation	NMRA Nation- al	NMRA Region	NMRA Division & SIGs
Article or Column	3	3	2	1
Photos or Art Work	3	3	2	1
Scale Drawing - Prototype	6	6	4	2

Keep in mind the following guidelines:

- A "page" is approximately 1200 words. If you are using MS Word to write the article, Review/Word Count can tell you the word count. Credit may be claimed for partial pages down to quarter pages.
- NMRA Publications (including SIG publications) with a circulation of more than 2000 may be considered National Publications; those with a circulation of more than 1000 are be considered Region Publications.
- Material published in 100% NMRA Club publications earns half the number of points as a NMRA Division publication.
- No more than half of the total required points (21) may be claimed for Division or 100% NMRA Club publications.

In the case of articles for one of the commercial publications, you do not need to wait for actual publication. A copy of the submitted article and a copy of the acceptance receipt are sufficient. However, you might find that the final article is actually longer than anticipated once you see the article in print which might impact your points. Articles submitted to the online Model Railroad Hobbyist magazine are the same for other national publications.

Live Clinics

Note that you can also receive credit for presenting live clinics at National or Regional conventions, Division meetings, etc. In order to be eligible for credit, the clinic must be prepared and presented by the member applying for the certificate, it must be at least 30 minutes in length, and it must include a handout (a copy of the handout must be included with the certificate application.) The number of points awarded for your efforts is:

A live clinic can only be claimed for Model Railroad Author points once, even if it presented more than once. Additional presentations of a clinic earn credit towards Association Volunteer.

Instructional Video Tapes and Multi-Media

These are presentations that are specifically created by the member applying for the certificate using video tape or other multi-media. This production process will generally involve such things as preparing a shooting script or story board and creating close-up shots to illustrate the material. Simply having a live clinic videotaped does not receive any credit. If the presentation is not interactive (for example, a video tape), then it earns credit at the rate of 1/2 point per minute of the presentation. If the presentation is interactive (requiring input from the viewer as it goes), then it earns credit as an "Electronic Publication", described below. To earn credit for an Instructional Video Tape or Multi-Media Presentation, it must be submitted directly to the AP Department General Manager for evaluation. Include his/her analysis and determination of credits with the Author certificate application.

Electronic Publications

You can also get credit for publishing material on the Web. This material earns credit at the same rate as Published Articles in Region publications. All photos, drawings, etc. are treated as 1/3 of a page.

Note that material that is published in more than one place or way (for example, both in a magazine and electronically, or in multiple electronic formats) can only earn credit once.

Also, the address (URL) of the material must be included with the certificate application. If the material is published on a non-publicly accessible forum (e.g. a private BBS), it is not eligible for credit. No more than half of the total required points (21) may be claimed for Electronic Publications.

There are some other conditions for the use of electronic publications which are on the NMRA website (https://www.nmra.org/author)

Of all of the AP categories, Author might be the easiest to document. Simply attach photocopies of the particular articles to your Statement of Qualifications along with a summary of your points for each item. Send the completed SOQ to your Divisional AP representative, **along with a photocopy of your NMRA membership card** and you are on your way toward another certificate!



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Answers

The Answers Are Out There By Robert Pethoud

Cascade Nail and Tack, Part 1

Though I've worked almost exclusively in HO scale for nearly 50 years, models in other scales often impress me. The Jan/Feb issue of *O Scale Trains* featured an article, "Out Behind the Old Mill," in which the author, Robert Ring, scratch built a large ¼-inch scale background structure from hardboard, balsa sheet stock, and scrap wood molding. The realism and appeal of his model inspired me to adapt Mr. Ring's techniques to construct a small HO scale foreground structure from MDF, basswood sheet stock, and cove molding. To test the feasibility of the modified techniques, I built just the façade for my building.

Previously in these pages I described how I built a small barn from basswood strips which I cut for myself from 1/32" sheets. The success of that experiment encouraged me to try this more challenging project. This time around I used a new tool (to me) to streamline the cutting: the wood strip cutter from Micro-Mark (item #14568). I've also started using Pan Pastels and thought that

this could be a good place to try those out on coloring a wooden structure. In this and the next column I'll explain what I did to create the façade for my Cascade Nail and Tack Company, Incorporated.

The building's footprint is most of a 6"x11" rectangle with a triangular piece of the northwest corner removed. The 6" wall is the front, so the structure is deeper than it is wide. It is to be three stories tall, with wood siding and a concrete foundation. I cut pieces of 1/8" thick MDF (medium density fibreboard) for all five walls and fastened them together with duct tape to test fit the model on the layout. Once I was happy with the overall shape and size, I took the walls apart and focused on the one that was to become the front—south wall—of Cascade Nail and Tack.

From my stash of window and door castings (Tichy, Grandt Line, Campbell, etc.) I selected some promising candidates and set about creating a pleasing arrangement. I decided to put two warehouse doors for loading trucks on the south wall and the customer entrance around the corner on the west wall. After measuring for accurate placement, I held each casting in place while I traced around it with a pencil to mark its location on the wall. Then I cut out openings for the doors and used a black permanent marker to color the wall behind the windows. To complete wall preparations, I drew vertical lines 16 scale inches



apart to mark stud locations and drew some horizontal lines to help align the boards I was going to prepare next.

The Midwest Products basswood sheets I purchased from my local hobby shop measure 3" x 24" x 1/32", with the grain parallel to the longest side. I cut across the grain to obtain smaller sheets all 3 actual inches wide and lengths of 8, 12, or 16 scale feet. I chose these lengths so that the boards would end at studs. I adjusted the strip wood cutter to make actual 3/32" wide (8 scale inches) boards and proceeded to cut all the boards with the grain from those smaller sheets. The Micro-Mark wood strip cutter easily made the boards mostly the

same width, but there was some variation. I had to set aside about 5% of them as noticeably too wide or too narrow.

The next step was to stain the boards to give a weathered appearance, since this is intended to show through a peeling, fading coat of paint. I used my usual weathering stain, 1 teaspoon of india ink in a pint of 91% isopropyl rubbing alcohol. All of the boards were dunked in the stain and then set out on a newspaper to dry. When dry, two-thirds of the boards, chosen at random, were dunked again. After those were dry, half of them were dunked a third time. The end result was a pile of boards in a nice variety of shades, ready to be attached to the wall.

Gluing the basswood boards to the MDF wall is straightforward, if a bit tedious. I plan about three rows of boards at a time, aligning the boards with the vertical stud lines and cutting the boards as needed to fit against any window or door frames. Make sure to vary the board lengths so that no vertically adjacent boards end at the same stud. When ready to glue, I use a coffee stirring stick to apply yellow carpenter's glue to the MDF and then put the boards in place with tweezers. Double check that the windows and doors fit into the spaces you've left for them.

Painting the windows and doors was done with spray cans. I planned to paint my building green with brown trim, but I wanted the windows to have white muntins, so I purchased cans of Rust-Oleum Shell White and Gloss Chestnut from my local hardware store. Painting began with all castings getting a coat of Shell White (basically an ivory hue) as a primer. When thoroughly dry, I carefully measured the windows and cut a small rectangular mask of blue masking tape for the muntin area of each. I stuck a length of tape onto a piece of glass and used an X-acto knife to precisely cut each rectangular mask. After the masks were placed, I sprayed a coat of the Gloss Chestnut on all of the castings.



This photo shows the progress on

the project when I was in the middle of gluing on the boards. Next time I'll describe the construction of the cornice, trim, and foundation, then move on to coloring with Pan Pastels. Until then, you can reach me with comments or questions at <u>pethoud@comcast.net</u>

I've Been Workin' on the Railroad(s)

I'm going to crib mercilessly for a moment from one of Mike McLaughlin's stories. No, you probably never met Mike. He was a good friend and one of those great folks who worked on the railroad because he truly loved it... and he was willing to share his knowledge and experiences... and his stories.

Like Mike, though in miniature, I've been a gandy, worked on signals, pulled probably several real miles of wire and laid maybe a real mile of track. On cork, on Homasote, on plywood (complaining loudly); Masonite (even more loudly), milled roadbed, clear pine. Lots of flex, lots of hand laid, a little sectional – and even some sectional on fiber ties...

I've learned to use everything from mounds of newspaper to screen (nasty stuff, but sometimes needed) to paper towels to foam board to build up scenery. I've covered them with plaster, plaster cloth, vermiculite, wallboard mud, even stucco.

I've built structures out of wood, styrene, aluminum, Masonite, foam core board, cast resin and cast plaster. Rolling stock out of brass, wood, styrene, resin... and painted and weathered all with acrylics, enamels, oil pastels, water colors, powdered pigments – using brushes, an airbrush, even my fingers.

Much of this was learned along the way from owners of the railroads I worked on; and was in turn taught to others as we worked together.

Skipping back up a couple of paragraphs, I never would have thought before I met Michael Stimac that I would come to know 30th Street on the Philadelphia Terminal Division. Awesome O scale! Slobbering Pennsy Freaks! How neat is that? Steve Cavanaugh and I met one afternoon at Keddie Wye – I added extensively to my love and knowledge of the WP while working at various times over 20 years on his two versions of the Canyon. What did I know about coal in the Appalachians? Nothing. But getting involved in Gary Seigal's EK Division lead to learning about coal tipples, loaders and processing plants, to building some fascinating structures, and a long term fascination with coal roads such as the Clinchfield and the Interstate.

Yeah, I'm a cement head. So a chance to do even a little modeling for the Frank Hlavaty's Lehigh and New England was doubly enjoyable – and in turn lead to more research on the Cement District in Pennsylvania. With apologies to Tony Thompson, I would posit that the SP in California is like the Pennsy everywhere else in the country. If you are modeling a railroad in the Golden State you are perforce also modeling the Espee. So even the Santa Cruz Northern has Southern Pacific seeming always underfoot. But if that is not enough, I've worked on both Scott Kew's and Otis McGee's versions of the Southern Pacific's Shasta Division. And I've put in time with others helping out with maintenance and upgrades at the La Mesa Club's famed Tehachapi railroad, and enjoyed learning about and working on Ed Merrin's NWP.

Most recently, of course, myself and a number of other PCR members have been working together for several years building the southern half of the Southern Division of the Central Vermont Railway. Other than Paul Weiss, I don't think any of us knew anything about the CV other than is was in New England and was owned by the Canadian National. Wow, the research we've done and the stuff we have learned! The people we have met!! The skills we are honing or learning and trying for the first time.

Mike said at one time that, looking back on 40 years of railroading, he might not have done things the way others would have, but he would not change a bit of what he did do. For myself, looking back on 40 years in the hobby, it has been an incredible journey so far. And so much of it has been because of all the railroads I had the joy to be workin' on. I wonder where my wanderin' feet will take me next?

Looking Back by Dave Connery, MMR, PCR Historian Voices - An Interview with Gus Campagna

Gus grew up with a railroad in his back yard – the Northwestern Pacific line between Sausalito and Alto. As a baby he hated the shrill whistle sound of the locomotive blowing for the near-by Corte Madera grade crossing - so his mother would pick him up and hold him as the train passed. She would also read children's Golden Books to him that featured railroads. At night, Gus would dream about trains jumping the tracks and chasing after him, tipping over on top of him, and he would wake up screaming. This created a fear of trains in Gus.

One day, when he was a very young boy, he was in the neighborhood when he heard a train coming. He feared it would derail and come after him so he started running but fell. A neighbor lady picked him up and told him, "No, it won't get you." She held him and had him wave to the locomotive as it passed. The engineer waved back and that was the end of his fears and the beginning of a love for trains.



Gus' interest in model trains also started at a very early age. A friend down the street had a large board in his basement and he and Gus would set up their HO trains and run them, then take it down when they had finished playing. Gus' father had Oscale trains on a board that came down from the wall, but they knew they should not play with those when his father was not around. Gus would be very careful when he lowered the board to look at the trains and put it back up afterward, but his father always knew someone had been fooling with his Lionel trains. His dad had grown up in the house next door and, as a boy, commuted on the train from Corte Madera to Tamalpais High School.

Gus got interested in model trains, as opposed to toy trains, when his younger brother gave his older brother's boys a set of Aurora cars. Gus added trains to the mix. But when the brother divorced, Gus got the trains back. Gus was living in Sonoma at the time, where he visited a hobby shop in town then and started reading *Model Railroader*. All he had room for was a switching layout, which only had a mainline and some sidings – but he wanted a much larger layout. It was during this time-period Gus attended several PCR conventions – the first was at Grass Valley in 1986 (held at the fairgrounds where Gus slept in his truck). The following year the Convention was in Concord - sponsored by the Walnut Creek Club - where Gus helped with the Company Store.

Gus helped on the 1988 Convention "Rails to the Redwoods" in Santa Rosa and it was during this time Harold Mentzer invited him to become a member of the Sonoma County Highballers where he met Don Cabrall and Steve Skold. The Highballers were primarily the group putting on the convention. Gus has been an active member of this round-robin group ever since. The group continues going strong, meeting every week and now has 20 "members" on the roster although not all are very active.

Gus again helped on the "Ninety on the High Iron" Oakland convention in 1990, where he served as Company Store Manager. With a background of computer classes at Santa Rosa Junior College, Gus created the first Convention web site (for River City Express) which added the convenience of paying by Pay Pal. Eventually Dave Grenier took over those responsibilities, made many improvements and has been doing a bang-up job, being much more computer savvy. Gus has continued editing the printed program for a number of conventions. He was again active on the committee as Registrar and Secretary of the 1992 convention in Santa Rosa, and he served as Chairman for the 1999 Convention held in both Willits and Ukiah – with a special day at the Roots of Motive Power and BBQ at the Community Center. Including the BBQ (banquet) in the cost of the convention was an innovation instead of as an extra cost add-on – which has been followed ever since, and provides a guarantee of good attendance at the function.

Gus had a layout in a 55' X 40' space in the upstairs of "the barn" in Petaluma, the Gold Hill and Udell Southern (GUSRR). One day Don Cabrall was over operating on the HO layout and asked to put together a train. He included only 40' cars and Gus realized the shorter cars (Gus had been using mostly longer 50' and 60' cars) made the train look a whole lot better on the layout. He has primarily employed 40' cars ever since. This layout used a five-cab system. Gus eventually turned one of the cabs into DCC while the other four remained for DC operation. This layout ended when Gus got a contracting job on Maui in Hawaii and was there for about 6 months. When that job completed Gus came back to California and returned to the contracting business. A problem with a leaky roof in "the barn" persisted and he decided to return to the family home.

For many years he had been planning his ultimate layout to fit into the basement of the house in Corte Madera. When he had Jim Providenza review the plan, Jim immediately found a serious problem. It was a two level layout and an operator would have to walk around the entire layout to catch up with their train at one location. This problem was resolved by adding a third level to the layout plan.

Jim also counseled Gus on the importance of having a prototype in mind so there was a realistic and consistent prototype after which to pattern things. Gus chose the California Western between Fort Bragg and Willits with a connection with to Northwestern Pacific at Willits.

In 1993 Gus married Mary Moore and within a few years PCR had a new member. Mary took on the Non-rail activities in 2001 before they moved to Soda Springs. Gus built their current home in Penngrove. They moved in before it was finished, but today it is nearly done. Since the new house did not have a basement, he wanted a separate building to house his dream layout. At first he saw a neighbor's metal building that seemed perfect but when Gus had it priced out it was way too expensive for them to afford. Instead, he had a pole barn built at about a quarter of the cost and that is where his current layout is being created. He started building his HO scale California Western Railroad four years ago, and has made exceptional progress on the layout. The railroad is a 40-mile long short-line between Fort Bragg and Willits where it interchanges with the NWP. The NWP has staging representing Eureka to the north and Tiburon to the south. In addition, there is a 10-mile logging branch line feeding the mill at Ft. Bragg. Track work on all three levels is complete, and Gus is now installing a ceiling over the peninsula that extends down the center of the layout. He has allowed for very roomy aisles based on his experience with other layouts where he noticed no matter how much planning went into the design, numerous operators always ended up working in the same area of the layout at some point in the session.

Harold Mentzer also got Gus involved with the Northwestern Pacific Railroad Historical Society. Gus was soon elevated to a position on the NWPRHS Board and at one meeting, he was asked to fill in for the absent Secretary. Soon Gus was the permanent Secretary of the society, a position he continues to hold to this day. In addition to Secretary, Gus has become Library Manager for the Society. Gus has been Publications Chair for PCR since 2001. Over the years Gus has served Redwood Empire Division as Superintendent, Chief Clerk, Newsletter Editor, and Membership Chair and was the PCR director from RED for two full terms and part of another term after a break. He has also helped on a number of PCR Conventions over the past 35 years serving as Company Store Manager, Registrar, Program Editor, Secretary and Chairman. He worked on the Company Store for the 2000 NMRA Convention in San Jose and edited the printed Program for the 2011 NMRA Convention in Sacramento. Gus has had the opportunity to attend a number of NMRA conventions outside our region and has been to regional conventions in both the Pacific Southwest Region and the Pacific Northwest Region, usually promoting PCR Conventions being held in RED.

Based on all this leadership, Gus has been recognized as RED Member of the Year on two occasions, first in 1991 and again in 2013. He received the PCR Presidents Award in 1999 and in 2004 he was the recipient of the prestigious John Allen Award. Gus has been awarded Chief Dispatcher, Volunteer and Official Certificates in the NMRA Achievement Program. He has mostly finished the requirements for several other Achievement Awards but needs to complete the paperwork. Gus enjoys the research necessary to build a layout and he likes operations. As a past contractor he also enjoys building structures but often finds the kit plans and directions wanting in comparison to what he was used to on full scale construction jobs.

After my first full day of "hunkering down", there are a few things I have been doing to keep my Model Railroading activities going.

Keeping up With the Club

I am a member of the Pleasanton Fairgrounds Club. We are locked out of the club building as the fairgrounds are officially closed until April 7 and the county order prohibits travel for something like modeling at the club. As we have two work/ operating nights a week at the club, the inability to go there reduces social interaction and modeling. 
Building a New Module

As you may be aware, we were planning to have on-demand operations on the California Central Coast On30 modular layout at the Concord PCR Convention in late April. Unfortunately, due to the current situation, the convention is cancelled. We will have to wait to do operations. As part of getting ready, I am building a new 12' x 2'-4" module set that models Moss Landing as it might have looked in the 1920/30s if the harbor had been dredged 50 years earlier. It is designed to have both central coast scenery (Hovden Cannery, Pacific Steamship based warehouse) and good operations with 12 spots for car movement. Yesterday was our first day of sheltering, and I was able to get all of the under-module electrical on the first of two six foot modules in the set done. If you are coming to the Just Trains Open House in October, I plan to have the modules there. Here are some design and progress pictures.


This is the design. If you are interested, we had a lively dialog on the Ry-ops-industrial SIG group about the module and design back in January and February

This is the final design of the module:



This is the first module underside with all switch machines and electrical wiring complete. I used Tortoises and DCC Wabbits with push buttons mounted by the switch for manual operation. The Tortoises are wired using Cat5 cables and RJ45 connectors making the wiring much simpler and easy replacement of a switch machine if required. This design was developed at the Pleasanton club. All of the Tortoises are mounted in boxes to reduce the throw depth (2.5" of foam to .5") and to keep them from extending below the level of the frame and subject to damage if the module is set on the floor. The other holes are for the building bases for three large buildings that will be removable for transport.

The module is a re-imagining of Moss Landing as it would have looked in the 1920s if the harbor had been dredged. This is how that would have looked on an actual map of the harbor from about 1910. As the Salinas River moved to a different outlet after the 1906 earthquake, the harbor mouth closed until it was dredged in 1947. As you can see on the 1910 map below, it is re-imagined on the module as an open and dredged harbor with the buildings positioned as shown in the "real" world including the actual PVCRR narrow gauge tracks.. Note the huge PG&E (nee Duke Energy) power station that dominates Moss Landing, and would block the barge spur, does not exist in this version of the past.



I hope this is a little inspiration for others to get a forgotten kit out or do some weathering. Social distancing is a great time to build a new model for the next contest!!!!! Better than watching TV!!!!

Please post your projects on the PCR groups.io site so we can all get inspired to go tackle something new...or even something old we have been ignoring.

If you need supplies, call your local hobby/train shop. Many are delivering, so you can get those things you need and still support our local businesses.

Finally, stay safe and keep modeling.

Coast Division Report

As this is my first stab at this, I don't have much to report. We had a good meet in late February at the Elks Club in Alameda. We're fortunate we were able to meet before the challenges we face today. The auction was a great success. Dave Connery coordinated a large donation from the estate of long-term modeler, Jerry Littlefield, that netted \$988 at the auction and was donated 100% to the Division. Many thanks to the Littlefield family for their generous donation and a reminder that donating your modeling items to the Division is a great help.



This is more of an introduction than a report. I was asked to "run" for the role and agreed, so, here we are. I have no idea why anyone voted for me. My primary reason for accepting was I was told that the Coast Division includes Hawaii, so I assumed I would need to make a least one inspection trip. Unfortunately, after accepting, I found that only rail travel is covered under our expense guidelines. While I am hopeful for a "Hawunell", it is not on the immediate horizon. So, I am focused on the division and continue expanding our activities.

On the board level, one area of focus is the increasing cost of venues, and the associated reduction in average unit price and total revenues from the auctions. The Division will be analyzing options and gathering member's input for decisions going forward. Other areas of focus are increasing volunteers, both for Divisional roles and for Clinics and open houses.

While I have been a modeler for many years, I have only been a member of the NMRA for the last couple. I look forward to meeting more of the PCR members, but I thought I would tell you a bit about myself.

As most of you, I started my model railroad career at a young age, with a Lionel 4-6-2 that, at some point, became an 0-6-0. My career blossomed with a 4x8 sheet of plywood, hinged from the wall in a shed, with a loop of HO track and three switches. That lasted until girls. After all, it was the 1970s.

I returned to modeling as my children grew and we moved into a house that could support a railroad. I joined the Niles club and built a 10x12 room layout based on the Sierra Railway (HO standard gauge, small steam). It got to 80% operating and 30% scenery (OK, 50/10%) when work and home rudely intruded. In the mid-90s I joined a large tech company and found myself in a lead role. For the next 15 years I was on a 90 hour week/50%+ travel work life. That and a move to Pleasanton killed model railroading. Tearing out the layout and putting the pieces in a storage cube was very difficult and became an emotional block as well.

Around 2014 I went to a train show and met the California Central Coast On30 modular folks. I liked the concept of both On30/modular and the CCC modelers, so I started hanging around. I eventually built a 2' x 6' module that I brought to a Coast Division meet a while back. I am now building my 7th and 8th modules combined into a 12' x 2.3" re-imagining of Moss Landing with a dredged harbor in 1917 and 12 car spots for operations. The CCC On30 was to have been set up in the ball-room at the PCR Conference in Concord in April. We had planned to offer on-demand operating/switching on the modular layout.

Being part of the CCC led to joining the ACCRS club in Pleasanton on the O layout side. The move to O scale was to focus on improving the layout at the Alameda County Fairgrounds. With about seventy thousand visitors every year, it is a great representation of model railroading. I am serving a second term as VP for the ACCRS, where we are dealing with the issue of a fairground that is moving from a rural cultural center to a major events center. The model railroad and current building do not fit into the long-range strategy.

Finally, after many years as a lone modeler, I joined the NMRA, directly resulting in this column.

I enjoy all aspects of modeling and railroads. I generally like modeling California narrow gauge (with license), but also like WP/SP both in transition and more modern, as well as Colorado narrow gauge. I enjoy building and electronics and computers. I have been trying operations and find it to be both interesting and challenging. I am intrigued by the role railroads had in creating modern America and the factors that have led to the current state of railroad affairs. My focus now is on building modules and equipment for the CCC On30 and some new projects in Pleasanton. More than enough to keep busy.




